He passed his healthy bird exam, finished quarantine, and was ready to meet Dizzy tiel to tiel! It didn't take long for the two to become friendly and soon Dizzy began to share his play space with Max.

Max is one of the many fortunate birds to be adopted quickly to a new, quality home with the bonus of providing companionship to a lonely bird – a Mickaboo success!

Sometimes a foster bird gets passed by for no apparent reason. One such bird in Mickaboo's care is Freddie, who has been a Mickaboo foster since 2011. Freddie came from a Placer County shelter where he was placed as a stray. His age is unknown but he is likely about 6-10 years old.

Coco has been a solo bird most of his life and unfortunately seems to have little interest in being friends with Freddie. Freddie will bow his head to get head scratches from Coco, but Coco just ignores him. Still, good-natured guy that he is, Freddie doesn't complain and continues to be a well-adjusted, happy bird. Of course Freddie's foster mom believes he would be much happier with a more social tiel friend, just like how Dizzy and Max now have each other.
